SECTION R320 ACCESSIBILITY AND UNIVERSAL DESIGN ELEMENTS

R320.1 Scope <u>Accessibility</u>. Dwelling units in a building consisting of three or more dwelling units or four or more condominium units shall meet the requirements of the California Building Code Chapter 11A. Covered Multifamily Dwellings include but are not limited to dwelling units listed in Section 1.8.2.1.2. Dwelling units within a single structure separated by firewalls do not constitute separate buildings.
